## 1. Introduction

This annually reviewed and published document sets out, and can be used as the reference for, the processes and selection criteria for selection to the British Biathlon Squads and Teams in the appropriate age categories. It describes the selection policy and process for athletes to be invited to join the British squads and/or to represent Great Britain in biathlon events.

### 1.1. Aim

The aim of the British Biathlon Union Selection Policy is to clearly define the procedures, processes and criteria for the selection of individuals to join British national biathlon teams and programmes. This Selection Policy, its processes and procedures support the BBU's long-term development plan that reflects commitment shown by the athletes, is inclusive, supports the staged development at each level of competition and is designed to produce consistent World Class performances at a range of international competitions that include most notably: The IBU World Championships, Youth & Junior World Championships, The Olympic Winter Games, European Youth Olympic Festival, Youth Olympic Games, Junior & Senior European Championships, as well as on the IBU World Cup and Senior/Junior IBU Cup circuits.

### 1.2. Remit

Selection will be made without bias or discrimination. The policy and processes are agreed and overseen by the British Biathlon Union (BBU), the National Governing Body for biathlon in the United Kingdom. The policy and processes are approved by the Board of the BBU.

The Selection Panel will lead on this process with the oversight of the BBU Board. The Selection Panel will select the Teams for the World Cups, World Championships, Youth and Junior World Championships and other IBU competitions. The Panel will recommend athletes to the British Olympic Association for selection to teams for the various competitions run under the Olympic banner. The Panel will also recommend athletes for other major sporting events, such as the World University Games as and when requested.

For Olympic events, the BBU will agree and publish the Selection Criteria and Procedures in co-operation with the British Olympic Association (BOA) for the Olympic Winter Games, the European Youth Olympic Winter Festival and the Youth Olympic Winter Games.

The Selection Panel will select athletes into the following British Teams, and/or subsequent international levels of competition:

1. World Cup Team, World Cup
2. IBU Cup Team, IBU Cup
3. Junior Team, IBU Junior Cup
4. OPA competitions (Alpine region race series)

In order to allow athletes to optimise their preparations for competitions, athletes achieving 'Team' status will be pre-selected for that level of competition, unless the team numbers exceed respective start places, where athletes would then be required to take part in the on-snow selection, as well as any summer testing periods.

## 2. Formation and Members of the Selection Panel

The BBU Board will appoint the Chair of the Selection Panel. The Chair may invite others with specialist knowledge to contribute for all or part of a meeting. Panel members must be free from all external conflicts of interest in the selection process.

The role of the Chair is to adjudicate the process, to be equitable to all Athletes, and to ensure that the process is applied with respect to meeting the objectives of BBU, as stated at the top of this document. The BBU Board may substitute an individual in place of any of the roles that are not filled at the time of the selection. Such nomination must be agreed by 66% of panel members.

### **3. BBU Selection Panel**

The quorum for a meeting of this selection panel shall be all three voting members. Any member of the panel with a conflict of interest e.g. a potentially selected athlete being a family member... should raise any conflicts at the earliest point in time so a course of action can be identified.

**Chair of Selectors:** BBU Sec Gen (deciding vote in case of a split decision)

- BBU Development Director
- BBU Elite Development Director
- BBU Member Elected Director
- BBU Chief Operations Officer

### **Athlete Agreements**

Athletes who are selected must sign a current BBU Athlete Agreement, setting out the athlete's obligations to BBU and hold a current BBU race licence as a condition of confirmation and retention of their squad/team status.

### **4. Process and Timelines**

The Elite, Performance and Development Programme selections will be made each year by the 30<sup>th</sup> of April. The selectors reserve the right to add or remove athletes from the respective programmes based on performance, progress, identification or attitude.

Selection minutes are not made public but are circulated to the Board. Redacted versions are available to any athlete who wishes to appeal the selection process results (see appeals process).

### **5. Eligibility**

The Panel will consider only those who hold a current BBU Race Licence:

Athletes will not be eligible for selection to specific competitions if:

- They are currently serving a suspension for: (a) doping in any sport; or (b) any IBU disciplinary offence.
- A medical officer considers, after a medical examination, or report from a medical support team, that an athlete is not fit to compete.

### **6. Prolonged absence from competition**

An athlete who, having competed at a given level, fails to compete for a continuous period of twelve months, will not automatically be authorised to compete at the same level, even if the formal criteria to compete at the level are still met. In such circumstances the athlete will be required to demonstrate full fitness and competition readiness, after which the Selection Panel shall consider whether the approval to compete is justified. In making such a judgement, the Selection Panel shall consider all the evidence at its disposal and shall be entitled, in cases of doubt, to continue to withhold entry to the higher level of competition until it is satisfied that the required level of performance has been reached.

For the avoidance of doubt, the provisions of the above are intended to cover absence from competition for any reason, including officially recorded Injury Status.

### **7. Appeal Process**

It is possible to appeal against decisions made by the Selection Panel. The Appeal Process is set out at Annex B. Athletes or their authorised representatives should consult this annex before submitting any appeal.

## Annex A to British Biathlon Selection Policy 2022-23

### BBU Selection Criteria

The BBU supports a multifaceted approach to selection, to define and select the athletes with the greatest potential.

#### A-1 Eligibility

Eligibility for BBU athletes wishing to be considered for relevant GBR Teams, levels of IBU competition and/or IBU/IOC championship events are laid in in Para 5 of the BBU Selection Policy.

#### BBU Teams

##### A-1.1 Minimum Eligibility Criteria for World Cup Team

Athletes who have met IBU qualifying point criteria shown below in the preceding 12 months in two or more WC/IBU Cup events are pre-selected for this level of competition as described in 1.2 of the Selection Policy:

Men	70
Women	80

The Selection Panel has absolute discretion to consider the performance level and field size of the event where the IBU points are scored before selecting an athlete.

##### A-1.2 Minimum Eligibility Criteria IBU Cup Team

Athletes who have met IBU qualifying point criteria shown below in the preceding 12 months in two or more WC/IBU Cup events are pre-selected for this level of competition as described in 1.2 of the Selection Policy:

Men	120
Women	150

The Selection Panel has absolute discretion to consider the performance level and field size of the event where the IBU points are scored before selecting an athlete.

##### A-1.3 Minimum Eligibility Criteria for Junior Team

Athletes can be considered if they are born in 2000-2006 and have met percentage criteria shown below in the preceding 12 months in two or more IBU Junior Cup event(s) are pre-selected for this level of competition as described in 1.2 of the Selection Policy:

## **IBU Levels of competition**

### **Criteria**

There will be 3 criteria used to assess the standard of BBU athletes which the Selection Panel will base their selections on. The BBU views 'competitive' as being able to qualify for the Pursuit race:

'A' Criteria – 1 race result meeting the A criteria demonstrates that the athlete is competitive at that level of competition.

'B' Criteria – 2 race results meeting the B criteria demonstrates that the athlete could achieve results that could be competitive. Athlete development will then be the focus of selection.

'C' Criteria – 3 race results meeting the C criteria meets a minimum standard, but the athlete is unlikely to be competitive in individual competitions. However, it may be in the interest of the BBU and/or athlete to be selected.

### **Wildcards**

Although athletes may meet BBU criteria, GBR's nation ranking may mean an athlete is not able to compete at a certain IBU level and will need to earn a starting place via the IBU wildcard quota allocation. An explanation of the IBU wildcards can be seen at 15.6.2 of the IBU Event and Competition Rules document.

## **A-2 World Cups**

### **A-2.1 Eligibility Criteria**

BBU will consider athletes for selection to the World Cup based upon the following IBU qualifying points criteria for Men and Women being achieved in the preceding 12 months:

If there are more athletes eligible and qualified for selection than quota places allocated, the selection panel has absolute discretion to select athletes who, based on the evidence available, are most likely to achieve the best result.

## **A-3 IBU Cups**

### **A-3.1 Minimum Eligibility Criteria**

Athletes who are not qualified to start trimester 1 must achieve one result within 30% at an OPA or equivalent<sup>1</sup> standard competition or meet the requirements specified in Appendix 2 to this document during the BBU Selection Races.

On-snow selection races will be used to make final selections if there are more qualified athletes than allocated start places.

<sup>1</sup> Results from national level competitions or other regional events such as the Scandinavian Cup may also be considered by the Selection Panel dependant on the attendance of competitors.

Junior athletes wishing to 'race up' into the IBU Cup Senior field may be considered if they are at Junior Team standard as specified at A-1.3 of this document.

The selection panel may also select an athlete to compete if it is felt that the athlete has displayed the ability to perform at the relevant level and it would be in the best interests of British Biathlon.

#### **A-4 IBU Junior Cups**

##### **A-4.1 Eligibility Criteria**

Athletes who have not achieved the B criteria standard in the preceding season must achieve one result within 30% at an OPA or equivalent<sup>2</sup> standard competition or meet the requirements specified at Appendix 2 to this policy during the BBU Selection Races.

On-snow selection races will be used to make final selections if there are more qualified athletes than allocated start places.

The selection panel may also select an athlete to compete if it is felt that the athlete has displayed the ability to perform at the relevant level and it would be in the best interests of British Biathlon.

<sup>2</sup> Results from national level competitions or other regional events such as the Scandinavian Cup may also be considered by the Selection Panel dependant on the attendance of competitors.

## **IBU/IOC Championship Events**

### **A-5 Championships Events**

Selection to represent Great Britain at championships events will be made without bias or discrimination and is open to any British Athlete who meets relevant A, B or C criteria.

#### **A-5.1 IBU World Championships (WCH)**

Selection for 2023 IBU World Championships, in Oberhof, Germany (6-19 Feb 23) is open to any British athlete who meets the eligibility criteria.

##### **A-5.1.1 Eligibility Criteria**

BBU will consider athletes for selection to the WCH based upon the following IBU qualifying points criteria for Men and Women in the preceding 12 months before the selection date of 22 Jan 23:

If there are more athletes eligible and qualified for selection than quota places allocated, the selection panel has absolute discretion to select athletes who, based on the evidence available, are most likely to achieve the best result.

#### **A-5.2 European Youth Olympic Winter Festival (EYOF)**

Nomination for the 2023 EYO in Friuli Venezia Giulia, Italy (23-28 Jan) is open to any British athlete who meets the eligibility criteria.

##### **A-5.2.1 Minimum Eligibility Criteria**

Athletes born in 2005 or 2006 be considered if they have met the below relevant % result in any category in the preceding 12 months before the selection date of 18 Dec 22.

If there are more athletes eligible and qualified for selection than quota places allocated, the selection panel has absolute discretion to select athletes who, based on the evidence available, are most likely to achieve the best result.

#### **A-5.3 IBU Youth & Junior World Championships (WJC)**

Selection for 2022 IBU WJC in Schuchinsk, Kazakhstan (3-12 Mar 23) is open to any British athlete who meets the eligibility criteria.

##### **A-5.3.1 Eligibility Criteria**

Athletes can be considered if they have met the below relevant % result in any category in the preceding 12 months before the selection date of 19 Feb 23.

If there are more athletes eligible and qualified for selection than quota places allocated, the selection panel has absolute discretion to select athletes who, based on the evidence available, are most likely to achieve the best result, which may be age relevant at this level.

#### A-5.4 Open European Championships (OECH)

Selection for 2022 IBU OECH in Lenzerheide, Switzerland (23-29 Jan 23) is open to any British athlete who meets the eligibility criteria.

##### A-5.4.1 Eligibility Criteria

BBU will consider athletes for selection to the OECH based upon the following IBU qualifying points criteria for Men and Women in the preceding 12 months before the selection date of 14 Jan 23

If there are more athletes eligible and qualified for selection than quota places allocated, the selection panel has absolute discretion to select athletes who, based on the evidence available, are most likely to achieve the best result.

#### A-5.5 Junior Open European Championships (JOECH)

The 2022 JOECH will take place in Madona, Latvia (13-19 Feb 23) is open to any British athlete who meets the eligibility criteria.

##### A-5.5.1. Eligibility Criteria

Athletes can be considered if they have met the below relevant % result in any category in the preceding 12 months before the selection date of 12 Feb 23.

If there are more athletes eligible and qualified for selection than quota places allocated, the selection panel has absolute discretion to select athletes who, based on the evidence available, are most likely to achieve the best result, which may be age relevant at this level.

### Other Championships and Competitions

#### A-6

Selection to represent Great Britain at championships events will be made without bias or discrimination and is open to any British Athlete who meets relevant A, B or C criteria.

#### A-6.1 World University Games (WUG)

The 2023 WUG will take place in Lake Placid, USA (12-20 Jan 23) is open to any British athlete who meets the eligibility criteria.

##### A-6.1.1 Eligibility Criteria

Athletes can be considered if they meet the BUCS and FISU eligibility criteria as set out in Appendix 4 and have met their respective standard as detailed below in the preceding season OR have demonstrated peer competence during BBU Programme camps and summer competitions before the BUCS, out of season, selection date of 15 Aug 22.

If there are more athletes eligible and qualified for selection than quota places allocated, the selection panel has absolute discretion to select athletes who, based on the evidence available, are most likely to achieve the best result, which may be age relevant at this level.

### A-6.2 OPA Competitions

Athletes starting their international career who aim to qualify for any IBU level of competition or Elite Programme athletes who are barred to start in IBU events will compete on the OPA race series<sup>3</sup>.

### A-7.1 Eligibility Criteria

Selection for the OPA race series is open to any British athlete who is a member of any of the following BBU Programmes:

- BBU Elite Programme
- BBU Performance Programme
- BBU Development Programme

### Selection to BBU National Programmes

#### A-7 Eligibility for selection to Elite or Performance Programme

Athletes will be selected to the Elite or Performance Programmes based on their on-snow international biathlon results.

#### A-7.1 Elite Programme

The Elite Programme is for Senior athletes who can, or are projected to be able to<sup>4</sup>, achieve 250 IBU qualifying points.

#### A-7.2 Performance Programme

The Performance Programme is primarily for athletes competing on the IBU Junior Cup but is also for promising Senior athletes who have achieved the following criteria or percentages during OPA<sup>5</sup> competitions:

#### A-7.3 Development Programme

The Development Programme is primarily for athletes stepping up from the Talent ID Campaigns or athletes who have been invited to train in this programme after such events as the National Championships. Athletes may also be invited to join this programme after demonstrating adequate performance levels via other national programmes.

<sup>3</sup> Other regional or national competitions may be attended if the dates and/or locations benefit the NGB. However, these competitions must be of a competitive level to enable development of athletes and be of a standard adequate to qualify for IBU race events e.g. Scandinavian Cup, German Cup, French Cup...

## Annex B to British Biathlon Selection Policy 2022-23

### BBU Appeal Process

Any Appeal against a decision of the Selection Panel will follow strict procedures.

Any Appeal against Selection for an Olympic Games will follow the Appeal Process laid down in the Olympic Games Selection Policy.

#### B-1 Grounds of Appeal

- a) An athlete, or their Authorised Representative, may make an Appeal against a Selection decision only on grounds that there has been a failure to apply the criteria correctly; and/or that the Selection Panel has failed to follow its procedures properly; that the Selection Panel's discretion has not been exercised in a reasonable manner and that such discretion was exercised in such a way as to be prejudicial to the Appellant.
- b) The Process In the first instance an Appeal is made to the Selection Panel, who will consider the Appeal and respond, either:
  - i. agreeing with the Appellant and changing the original decision; or
  - ii. rejecting the Appellant's Appeal and explaining its reasons for the decision.
- c) If an Appellant is not satisfied with the outcome of the Selection Panel's further deliberations, then the athlete, or their Authorised Representative, may make a further Appeal to a different panel, the Appeal Panel (see below), based on the same grounds of Appeal and Appeal Notice.
- d) Outcomes available to the Appeal Panel are:
  - i. to confirm the Selection decision under Appeal and reject the Appeal; or
  - ii. to refer the Selection decision under Appeal back to the Selection Panel, identifying errors they have made in their deliberations or process, and requesting a new decision is made, or the original decision is confirmed correcting any errors made by the Selection Panel within 72 hours (or such time as the Appeal Panel may stipulate); or
  - iii. to reverse the Selection decision under Appeal and confirm the Selection of the athlete. This outcome is only available to the Appeal Panel if the athlete's health and/or safety was not one of the reasons for the original decision.

#### B-2 How to Appeal

- a) An Appeal Process is commenced by an athlete or their Authorised Representative, addressing an email to the Chair of the Selection Panel appealing against a decision made by the Selection Panel that resulted in the athlete not being selected. ("Notice of Appeal"). The email should be sent to [info@britishbiathlon.com](mailto:info@britishbiathlon.com) The email must be sent within 2 business days of the notification of Selection/non-Selection for a Competition, or within 5 business days of any Squad Selection notification/non-Selection.
- b) The Notice of Appeal must clearly set out the details of the decision which is being appealed and include full details of an athlete's ground(s) of Appeal. The Notice should attach any documents or written evidence relevant to the grounds of Appeal and which are relied upon

by the athlete.

- c) All Appeals must be accompanied by a bank transfer of £250 which will be refunded should the Appeal be upheld under Clause B-1 d) ii. and iii. above.
- d) Any Appeal to the Appeal Panel must be made within two business days of being informed of the Selection Panel's further deliberations under Clause B-1 b).
- e) In the event of any Appeal, minutes of the Selection Panel's Selection decisions or of any Appeal hearing will be made available to the Appellant upon request and will be provided within one business day of such request. In some cases, it may be necessary to redact elements of the relevant minutes.

### **B-3 The Appeal Panel**

- a) BBU will nominate an Appeal Panel comprising of at least 3 individuals, none of whom sat on the Selection Panel, and none of whom are conflicted. One of the Appeal Panel shall be a lawyer by training. The Appeal Panel will select a Chair.
- b) The Appeal Panel must receive an Appeal Notice ("the Second Appeal Notice") within two business days of being informed of the Selection Panel's further deliberations under Clause 7.4. The only fee required is when the Appellant first makes an Appeal to the Selection Panel. A second fee is not required if the Appeal reaches the Appeal Panel.
- c) The Chair of the Appeal Panel will convene a meeting to take place within five business days of the Second Appeal Notice, or, if urgent for reasons of a specific event, then to take place within an accelerated time frame.
- d) The Appeal Panel will investigate the grounds of Appeal set out in the Second Appeal Notice and establish, to their reasonable satisfaction, which of the outcomes set out in Clause 7.6 is appropriate. In most cases the Chair of the Appeal Panel will notify the Selection Panel and the athlete, or their Authorised Representative, of the Appeal Panel decision immediately after the meeting. In some situations, the Appeal Panel will make a reserved decision which will be communicated to the Selection Panel and the athlete, or their Authorised Representative, on a later date.

## Appendix 2 to British Biathlon Selection Policy 2022-23

### Testing and Selection

This appendix distinguishes the differences between OPA Percentage results and IBU qualifying points, the reasons for both as well as BBU selection races.

#### BBU Selection Races

Ultimate selection to represent GBR on the International (IBU) competition circuit will result from performance during on-snow selection races, where required<sup>6</sup>. If there are several athletes closely matched after concluding the selection races, then performance during summer training camps and any test races will be considered. The more national programme camps an athlete can partake in, the better evidence an athlete will have for selection.

A period has been identified to hold, where required<sup>7</sup>, on-snow selection races in Obertilliach, Austria. The exact format of the races will be confirmed closer to the time which will reflect the needs of the selection process and/or any environmental restrictions<sup>8</sup>.

That period is: **24-25 Nov 22**

For athletes who have no previous season results aiming to race at any level of IBU competition a % behind the average of the respective group will be used to assess performance levels along with a recommendation from the respective coach to preparedness to race at the relevant level.

For the 2022/23 season this only applies to the IBU Junior Cup

Youth & Junior Men	25%
Youth & Junior Women	40%

#### OPA Percentage

To ensure, as best as possible, that athletes are pitched at the right level of competition, the OPA or equivalent standard race series will be used to judge the on-snow performance of athletes.

#### IBU Qualifying points

Once competing on the IBU circuit, advancement to a higher level of competition, seasonal championship events and to qualify for following trimesters will be determined through an individual's results via the IBU Qualifying Points system.

Please note that the BBU's standards are often more stringent than the standard of the IBU. This is because we do not want athletes to simply race at the highest possible level, but rather be competitive at the right level for the athlete, who can then take that experience, confidence and positiveness onto the next level.


## Appendix 3 to British Biathlon Selection Policy 2022-23

### BBU Development Plan and British Championships

#### BBU Development Plan

The programme will consist of four tiers where talented Athletes will progress through the pathway maximizing all the opportunities at lower levels to enhance their experience and performance. Coaches at each level should be supported by the BBU to ensure consistency and continuity through an entire cycle. A pool of wider coaches will be available on an adhoc basis when numbers dictate. The levels will be:

Tier One - Club:	British Biathlon Clubs & UK Hubs
Tier Two - Development:	Rising Stars & National Development Programme.
Tier Three - Performance:	National Performance Programme
Tier Four - Elite:	World & IBU Cup Elite Programme.



## British Championships

The results from the National Championships will be used by the BBU to identify new talent that will be invited to attend a BBU Talent ID Camp or selected directly to the National Development Programme.

A selection panel meeting will be held, before the final prize giving, to identify and publish a list of such athletes, who will then in turn be able to approach representatives of the panel during the final prize giving evening to enquire about the process and requirements<sup>9</sup> from that point.

In general, we will not select new athletes to the international circuit following the British championships for the following main reasons:

1. If an IBU Cup athlete does not record a result better than 250 IBU Qualifying points in the last trimester (3) of the season, then they are barred from starting in the first trimester the following season.
2. Depending on the location and timing of the races during trimester 3, it may not be possible to logistically arrange for athletes to compete<sup>10</sup>.

However, if there are athletes that are clearly competing at a high enough level and it would be in the interest of the athlete's development and/or the interests of the BBU then we will look at these athletes on a case-by-case basis. This is most likely, but not uniquely, going to be case in the Youth & Junior categories.

Individual clubs (including military teams) are encouraged to highlight talent within their teams which might not be apparent due to poor material, time on snow, level of coaching...

## Appendix 4 to British Biathlon Selection Policy 2022-23

### INTERNATIONAL UNIVERSITY SPORTS FEDERATION (FISU) COMPETITIONS

**INT 1.1 Eligible participants** Further to any FISU regulations in place at the time, for an individual to be eligible to represent BUCS/GB Students in FISU competitions they shall:

**INT 1.1.1** Be a British (United Kingdom) national.

**INT 1.1.2** Be a registered student at an institution which is a recognised provider of Higher Education (HE).

*AND*

**INT 1.1.3** Be within the age range limits for the specific event they are attending, as set by FISU.

*AND*

**INT 1.1.4** Be registered on a course which is at or above one of the following minimum levels:

- Level 4 on the Framework for higher education qualifications in England, Wales and Northern Ireland (FHEQ).
- Level 7 on the Scottish Credit and Qualifications Framework (SCQF).
- Level 4 on the Regulated Qualifications Framework for England and Northern Ireland (RQF).
- Level 4 on the Credit and Qualifications Framework for Wales (CQFW).

**INT 1.1.4.1** An individual at an institution outside of the UK shall be registered on a course equivalent to those covered under INT 1.1.4.

*AND*

**INT 1.1.5** Be undertaking a study programme equivalent to:

- Where the course is credit rated under CATS (Credit Accumulation and Transfer Scheme), at least 60 credits per year.
- Where the course is run using guided learning hours, a minimum of 225 hours per year.
- Where the course is a postgraduate course which is not credit rated, no less than 50% of the full-time student programme per year.

**INT 1.1.5.1** A year will be taken as 12 months from the start date of their course.

**INT 1.1.5.2** An individual at an institution outside of the UK shall be undertaking a study programme equivalent to the requirements of INT 1.1.5.

*AND*

**INT 1.1.6** Be a player who is permitted by the International or National Governing Body of the sport concerned to participate in FISU competition alongside any other competition in that sport.

*AND*

**INT 1.1.7** Meet the Sport Specific Eligibility Requirements as defined in the individual competition selection policy for that competition

**INT 1.2 Special cases for participation** Further to any FISU regulations in place at the time, the following individuals are classified as eligible to represent BUCS/GB Students in FISU competitions:

**INT 1.2.1** Notwithstanding INT 1.1.5, an individual who is otherwise eligible under INT 1.1 on a

sandwich/industrial placement as part of their course is eligible during this time.

**INT 1.2.2** A former student of an eligible institution (as per INT 1.1.2) who has obtained an eligible qualification (as per INT 1.1.4) from said institution in the calendar year preceding the event.

**INT 1.2.3** A student who would otherwise be eligible under INT 1.1. who has their studies suspended will not be eligible to compete until such a time as their studies recommence.

**INT 1.3 Transgender athletes** BUCS supports equal opportunities in sport for all, to include transgender athletes on the basis of the gender with which they identify. BUCS promotes a zero-tolerance approach to transphobia and any person or institution found to be in contravention of this regulation will face disciplinary action under REG 5.

**INT 1.3.1** For FISU competitions, the policy on transgender participation of FISU and/or the International Federation whose sport specific regulations are being followed shall apply.

**INT 1.3.2** Drug testing procedures and prohibitions, as outlined in INT 1.4, also apply to athletes who identify as transgender. Any athlete receiving treatment involving a Prohibited Substance or Method, as described on the World Anti-Doping Agency's Prohibited List, should apply for a standard Therapeutic Use Exemption.

**INT 1.4 Anti-Doping** All participants in FISU competitions are subject to the Anti-Doping rules of UK Anti-Doping (UKAD), the World Anti-Doping Agency (WADA), FISU, and the specific sport's International and/or National Governing Body. As such:

**INT 1.4.1** All participants are subject to testing.

**INT 1.4.2** Any individual who is serving a suspension as a result of an Anti-Doping rule violation will not be eligible to participate in any FISU competitions.

All delegates will be required to complete the UKAD Introduction to Clean Sport qualification prior to attending the FISU Winter World University Games 2023.

**INT 1.5** Allowing ineligible participants to represent an institution will result in appropriate disciplinary action being taken. Athletic Union or equivalent staff should in cases of doubt refer the circumstances to the BUCS Sport Compliance and Governance Manager.
